We value and support our community. We are seen as the hub of the community



Message from the President


2011 was a year of preparation and focus on what we started last year - the implementation of our strategic direction for a new building.

Having completed a Best Use Site and Building Study through Gibbs Gage Architects in early 2011, we began our work towards the engagement of a builder for a "Design Build." The Board initially met with several builders to discuss build options and proposals. The board then appointed a volunteer Building Advisory Committee to follow through with the development of an RFP (Request for Proposal) and preparation of Tender for Bids to be sent out.

Currently the Building Advisory Committee is meeting weekly and hopes to have a decision on a General Contractor within the next few weeks, for Board approval. The timing on engaging a Contractor is however dependent on the bids meeting our specifications on the Design Build process.

Over the past year the Board has given a lot of time and energy to engaging Fund Development Council. A vital piece of work the board has focused on was to develop strategies to assist us in developing a Capital Campaign. We are currently well on our way to implementing that Capital Campaign and are in the process of solidifying a Volunteer Campaign Cabinet and Campaign Management team that will work with

and support Volunteer Canvassers around fundraising activities.





Director and staff, work hard to meet drastically increased demands for food services and programs. The Airdrie Food Bank's strategic plan to move forward with the construction of a new building is one that will support the clients we serve for the next 25 years. With community support and in consultation with professional services and government, we will achieve our goal of a new permanent, purpose-built facility.

All of the work accomplished over the past year could not have been undertaken without the strong and active support of the AFB Board. Thank you for all the work you do!

My thanks as well to the AFB Executive Director and staff, who frequently go above and beyond the call of duty. We are indeed fortunate to have them on our team.



Financial Operations

The year 2011 yielded both successes and challenges in the area of finances.

We were the top winner in the Joey's Community Revival Project which provided us with a prize of \$15,000.


Our FCSS funding was reduced by \$20,000 from the previous year while we witnessed an increased need for our services.

Government grants came through Family and Community Support Services (FCSS), Canada Heritage and Alberta Community Spirit.

Fundraising money was generated through the Empty Bowls Festival, TreeCycle and many business and community events.

We are very grateful for the huge support our community gives up making up over 78% of the funds needed to support our programs and operations.

Hamper Stats

The number of people who are in need of the Food Bank's support in Airdrie has risen drastically in the last 25 years.

The graph to the left represents the number of hampers and people served between 1985 and 2011.

Note: These numbers are for regular hampers only and do not include food provided through our other programs and services.





Food Intake Statistics

We certainly need and appreciate the increased support from our community in order to meet the rising demand for our services.

This graph shows the amount of food donated to the Airdrie Food Bank between 2007 and 2011.

The additional food donations are needed but do come with storage challenges. Over the last few years we have run out of room and have found it necessary to rent extra storage to hold the additional food.

Airdrie Food Bank Statistics

In 2011 we provided the following support to families and individuals in Airdrie and area:

- 1,186 hampers to 3,370 people including
 1,778 (53%) adults and 1,592 (47%) children
- Bread and extras to 2,718 families comprised of 7,563 individuals
- 5,673 breakfasts to children aged 5 10
- 9,166 emergency shelf items to 22 school programs
- Best beginning food hampers for 6 expectant mothers
- Formula and/or milk for 87 new mothers
- 59 emergency packs to local agencies

The Need for Food

Clients of the Airdrie Food Bank are individuals and families who are in a crisis situation and turn to us for help. Some of the reasons they find themselves in this position are:

- Working poor (people working at minimum wage or less than full time)
- People with disabilities
- People receiving social assistance or living on a fixed income
- Newcomers to Airdrie and area (e.g. immigrant families)
- People experiencing unexpected financial crisis such as job loss, illness, and/ or increase in rent and utilities
- Abandoned spouses and/or families
- Those missed or not serviced by the social system
- Victims of domestic abuse





Faces of the Food Bank

The following client stories are a sampling of what we hear at the Airdrie Food Bank. They are based on real life situations although names have been removed and circumstances changed slightly to protect our client's identities.

An upper middle class family lives in a nice house in one of the better areas of Airdrie. Dad works while Mom stays home to raise their children. Suddenly Dad moves out leaving Mom with huge bills and no income.

A 16 year old boy living with his single mother regularly goes to school without breakfast or lunch. There is little to no food in the house.



An elderly couple lives in fear of their mentally handicapped and abusive adult son; any extra money is stolen by the son to support his addictions.

A construction worker falls and hurts his back. He is unable to work for 6 weeks and with no income during that time, he struggles to feed his young children.

A young woman finds herself pregnant without support from family or knowledge of how to look after herself or her new baby.



A war veteran comes to the food bank and tears up with gratitude at the amount of food supplied to him.

On behalf of our community we were able to assist every individual/family listed above and many more whether it was through food support, referrals to supporting agencies, a friendly face or other assistance needed. We were there to help.



Programs & Services

Regular Hampers

Hampers provide 7 to 10 days' worth of food for individuals and families. It contains all food groups including meat, dairy and produce. Hampers can be accessed 6 times in a 12 month period and only once every 30 days. Clients must qualify for this program.

Milk and Formula for New Moms

Milk and/or formula are provided to support moms and their babies. This program operates in partnership with Community Links and the Calgary Health Authority who makes the referrals and monitor health of mom and baby.

Best Beginnings Hampers

Best Beginnings is for expecting moms and their families. The program operates in partnership with the Calgary Health Authority and Community Links. Women are referred to us and we provide nutritious food support for them while they are expecting.





A day's worth of food that doesn't need preparation including items such as juice boxes, easy open cans, granola bars and high protein nutritious snacks. Packs are distributed by local agencies and churches to individuals as needed.

Snack Attack

Emergency snack, breakfast and lunch food items are provided to any student who is hungry through 22 school programs in Airdrie and surrounding area. We do not limit items given to what has been donated to us only, so items are purchased by us, as needed.

R.J.Hawkey Breakfast Program

A program that feeds breakfast to children aged five to ten every school day. Operating from 7:15 until 8:00 a.m. this program fills a vital need in the children's lives, providing nutritional support as well as caring for their social and emotional needs.

Bread & Extras

Bread and extra food items are available to anyone in need at any time during our regular office hours. Clients do not need to qualify for this program and are encouraged to stop in any time we are open and as often as needed to pick up available extras.

A day when we open the Food Bank for a tour, serve refreshments and show our community what we have accomplished with their support.


Soup-N-Bowl Saturday

Community

The Airdrie Food Bank is tremendously supported by our community including help from businesses, schools, churches, community groups and caring individuals.

With approximately 10% of our funding in 2011 coming from government support, we rely on donors and fundraising events to make up the remaining 90% of money needed to purchase perishable food products as well as support programs and operations.

Every year individuals and organizations in our community find innovative ways to raise money and the thousands of pounds of food we need to fight hunger in the Airdrie area. Even children help by organizing food drives - birthday parties are one popular option.

Our local media (weekly newspapers, radio and social media groups) advertise for us at little or no cost as well as help spread our messages online.

The community continues to support us at special events including our annual Silent Auction and the Empty Bowls Festival.





Our History

The Airdrie Food Bank was established in 1984 when a group of caring individuals from the community recognized a need. In 1998 the church basement where we were being housed became too small for the increased demand and we moved to a room in the Regional Health Building.

In 2006, the Regional Health Building was needed for other uses and the Airdrie Food Bank began a campaign to look for a new location. The community stepped up to support us with the Agricultural Society giving the Food Bank a warehouse and the City of Airdrie leasing us land for a 5 year term. In 2011, that lease was extended to a 25 year term in 5 year increments.



Our Future Plans

The Airdrie Food Bank will continue to work hard with our community to meet the drastically increased demand for food services and programs.

Our hope for the future is to build a new permanent, purpose-built facility. Our long term lease allows us the opportunity to continue our services while moving ahead with an expansion that will meet the increased demand and serve us well into the future.
